STEP ELEVEN: Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God, *as we understood Him,* praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

". . . [A]Imost inevitably we become dissatisfied; we have to admit we have hit an uncomfortable and maybe a very painful sticking point.

Twelfth-stepping, talking at meetings, recitals of drinking histories, confessions of our defects and what progress we have made with them no longer provide us with the released and abundant life. Our lack of growth is often revealed by an unexpected calamity or a big emotional upset. Perhaps we hit the financial jack pot and are surprised that this solves almost nothing; that we are still bored and miserable, notwithstanding.

As we usually don't get drunk on these occasions, our bright-eyed friends tell us how well we are doing.

But inside, we know better. We know we aren't doing well enough. We still can't handle life, as life is. There must be a serious flaw somewhere in our spiritual practice and development.

What, then, is it?

The chances are better than even that we shall locate our trouble in our misunderstanding or neglect of AA's Step Eleven — prayer, meditation, and the guidance of God. The other Steps can keep most of us sober and somehow functioning. But Step Eleven can keep us growing, if we try hard and work at it continually. If we expend even five percent of the time on Step Eleven that we habitually (and rightly) lavish on Step Twelve, the results can be wonderfully far-reaching. That is an almost uniform experience of those who constantly practice Step Eleven."



While the Trustees hold final responsibility for A.A.'s world service administration, they should always have the assistance of the best possible standing committees, corporate service directors, executives, staffs, and consultants. Therefore the composition of these underlying committees and service boards, the personal qualifications of their members, the manner of their induction into service, the systems of their rotation, the way in which they are related to each other, the special rights and duties of our executives, staffs, and consultants, together with a proper basis for the financial compensation of these special workers, will always be matters for serious care and concern.

The longtime success of our General Service Board will rest not only on the capabilities of the Trustees themselves; it will depend quite as much upon the competent leadership and harmonious association of those non-Trustee committee members, corporate service directors, executives, and staff members who must actively carry on A.A.'s world services. Their quality and dedication, or their lack of these characteristics, will make or break our structure of service. Our final dependency on them will always be great indeed.

Far more than most of the Trustees, these servants will be in direct contact with A.A. world-wide, and their performance will be constantly on view. They will perform most of the routine labor. They will carry on most of our services. They will travel widely and will receive most visitors at the Headquarters. They will often originate new plans and policies. Some of them will eventually become Trustees. Because this group will form the visible image of world service, most A.A.'s will measure our service values by what they see and feel in them. Members of this group will not only *support* the world leadership of the Trustees; in the nature of the case they will be bound to *share* world leadership with them.

Tradition Eleven: Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and film.

Facts about anonymity in A.A.

- A.A. members may disclose their identity and speak as recovered alcoholics, giving radio, TV and Internet interviews, without violating the Traditions so long as their A.A. membership is not revealed.
- A.A. members may speak as A.A. members only if their names or faces are not revealed. They speak not for A.A., but as individual members.
- Experience suggests that A.A. members . . . Use last names within the Fellowship, especially for election of group officers and other service jobs.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30. The primary purpose of Intergroup was read.

The September minutes were approved pending the change of the date at the top of the page.

Treasurer's Report: Mary Jo presented the treasurer's report for August. Contributions for August were 22% below budget. Salaries are higher than budget due to 3 pay periods vs. equal monthly budgeted amount (32,000/12) Contributions (Group, Faithful Fivers, and Special) \$2,936 - 39.8% of Income. August Sales 4,445 - 60.2% of Income. Although total expenses are below budget we have had 2 consecutive months with substantial losses. Our YTD contributions (had we not received the special contribution) and Office Sales are \$7,000 below budget. This is a trend we do not want to see continue. Office supplies are up because the purchase of paper for meeting directories has not been broken out yet. Night owl expense is high due to printing and mailing of new packets. Expense for conferences is for air fare for Office Manager to attend Intergroup Managers conference in Ohio. Manager did not attend last year so budget was not set up.

The Office Report: Tom delivered the office report for August. The staff has been in transition with our newest employee, Matt. Tom will visit Akron, OH where he will attend a seminar for Intergroup office managers. He is thankful for being sent. As always, there are a plethora of service opportunities available at the office.

Website Report: Jonathan presented the September website report. He's added a tagline: "A Local Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous" to the header of all pages on the site. He's kept the *Lifeline* updated throughout the month and added a meeting statistics page to the site.

Outreach: Alfred presented the September Outreach report. A number of volunteers are helping to reach more area meetings. Make sure to thank Jerry, Greg, Mary J, Val, and Charlie as well as Alfred for carrying the message.

Night Owl Report: Dianne presented the September night owl report. We have three shifts open now. Dianne will be promoted to Night Owl Coordinator at the end of the year and will need a new assistant. Night Owl holds an orientation for new operators on the third Saturday of every month in the Intergroup office.

Vote on Non Conference Literature Tonight was the final vote on whether or not to include non-conference literature in the office. It took five ballots to decide, with few changes on each round. The final vote was that we would not be incorporating materials and literature that are not approved by the general service conference. We would like to thank the groups of Saint Paul for their interest and involvement in this debate. It's the groups we serve who make it possible for us to run Intergroup.
