It was important to admit my defects of character in the order presented in Step Five: "to God, to ourselves and to another human being." Admitting to God first paved the way for admission to myself and to another person. As the taking of the Step is described, a feeling ogf being at one with God and my fellow man brought me to a resting place where I could prepare myself for the remaining Steps toward a full and meaningful recovery."

# Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose -- to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

I used to think, a few years ago, that I would like to be a member of a minority group. it seemed that, though they suffered discrimination and prejudice, they had purpose, and each member always had something on his side—his fellows.

Then I did become a member of a minority group: I became a practicing alcoholic. As a member of this group, I knew discrimination and prejudice; I was socially unacceptable; my physical presence caused discomfort in those around me.

There is no single cataclysmic event that drove me to seek help—just a soul-sickness so desperate there was no longer any living with it. A few attempts to end it all resulted in humiliating frustration and hospital stays. I'd exhausted the patience of family and friends. I'd consulted with doctors and lied about my condition and habits. I'd slammed every door that was open to me. Except one.

So I became a member of another minority group. I joined the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, where members have a purpose, where they are united to conquer a common foe and make a better world.

## Notes From your Central Office...

As I write this in April, our Fellowship is celebrating the 75th Anniversary of the publication of our Big Book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, in 1939. "The first hundred" A.A members took an enormous risk in this. They formed a corporation, spent \$25 for shares in it, collaborated in writing the book, and had 4750 copies printed to sell to the public. That was all they could then afford to have printed.

And then the whole endeavor looked like a failure when the hoped-for sales did not occur. The small A.A. office in New York was closed for lack of funds, and the books and all went into storage.

As we know, things got better. Magazine articles in *Liberty* and *The Saturday Evening Post*, and newspaper coverage of the Rockefeller dinner generated interest and inquiries, the first printing sold out, the shareholders were paid, and in March, 1941, a second printing of the first edition went on sale. The "mushrooming" period came to pass, and a dozen more printings of the First Edition occurred before the Revised Second Edition of the Big Book was published in 1955.

Since 1939 millions of Big Books have been sold and we are in our Fourth Edition. During 2012 alone, AA World Services sold 950,000 copies—just shy of a million—of the Big Book in the English language. There are also Big Books in Spanish, French and 47 other languages from Arabic to Zulu. In 2013, the Smithsonian named *Alcoholics Anonymous* one of the 88 most important books in American history.

On April 7, our office received its first shipment of the commemorative 75th anniversary edition of the Big Book, a reproduction of the first printing of the book as it was in 1939. In the first week we had them, the office sold over 100 copies, a far cry from the experience of 1939!

It's pretty easy to see why, as AA World Services has done a tremendous job with this edition. It is a big book—over a half inch taller, wider and thicker than our Fourth Edition, and weighing more than half a pound more. As in 1939, it is bound in red cloth, and has a pretty garish red, yellow and black dust cover. The Doctor's Opinion starts on page one, so Chapter Five has been pushed back to page 70. There is even a personal story, Lone Endeavor, included which was only in the 4750 copies of the 1939 printing, and has never been in the book since.

AA World Services will only be offering this anniversary edition until the 2015 International Conference takes place next July in Atlanta. We'll try to keep these in stock for you in our store until then.
