# STEP 10

Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

Sounds pretty easy does'nt it. Just admit when I am wrong. Piece of cake! I can do this while standing on my head. I think. At first blush that was my original take on Step Ten. How difficult can this be? Once I took a closer look I realized that this step is more involved. It has layers of depth that I did not understand. They very premise intimates that I can distiguish right from wrong. Can I? I'm not quite as sure now as I was when I first started working on this step.

How can I be sure that I am doing this correctly and to the best of my ability?

In Step Four I took a moral inventory of myself. The very nature of this implies a universal standard. No grey area here. A universal principle stands on its own merit whether I agree with it or not. That's the point. It is a line drawn and the choices that we make fall either on one side or the other. We are either right, or we are wrong. The question then becomes on what basis, or what influences if you will, these decisions. The answer to this will go along way in determining how effectively we are working the Tenth Step.

We each view the world in our own unique

way. As individuals, no one else has the exact same experiences that I have had. Where I was born? How I was raised? What town did I live in? Where did I go to school? Who were my friends? The list goes on from there. Ad infinitum. The total sum of of the answers to these questions influence how I view my place in the world and everthing in it that surrounds me. I don't think of it in these terms when I make decisions. It however is always there subconciously guiding me through every twist and turn that life throws at me. It is baked into the cake. I can not remove it. Often times I do not even acknowledge that it exists. The way that I view the world and the people in it has a direct impact on my conception of morality. Huh?

When the blueprints for a new building are drawn up it includes the specifications for the foundation. If the foundation is not on solid footing, the rest of the stucture can be compromised. This same principle applies to our own lives. What is the foundation that we are building upon? This where the steps come in. We are going through a proceess that deconstructs our lives. We tear off the veneer of delusion and confusion that years of addiction helped us to form our current world view. Our moral compass is out of whack. The steps help us to re-align our lives based upon principles that are universal in nature. Once at the bottom, a new foundation can be laid. We come to an understanding of what the root causes are that have influenced our lives. This is the starting point for a new life that puts sobriety and sober living as the foundation of our renewed life.

Honesty, openess and willingness are the cornerstones of this new beginning. It is like a three legged stool, if you remove one of the legs it will fall over. You need all three. Take time to make sure that you are getting it right. This is not a sprint. It is a marathon. Half measures avail us nothing. Once the cement is poured for a new foundation, it will eventually harden. It is important to remove any impurity. This is the essencee behind the Fourth thru Ninth steps. We are tearing out the old foundation to make ready for the new one that we are laying in sobiety.

How successful we are at this point will entirely depend on how willing we are to leave no stoned unturned. Everything is on the table. We get out of it what we put into it. Am I willing to go all the way and take an honest look at my life?

If I have worked the first nine steps to the best of my ability the Tenth Step takes on new meaning. My compass has been re-aligned. It is based upon moral and spiritual universals. I have a clearer understanding of what determines my view of what is right and what is wrong. I have a more realistic grasp on reality and how I fit into it. The reason that I can promptly admit is because now I have a true understanding of what is right and what is wrong. Guided by universal principles that align with my conscience, I can navigate through daily life with the assurance that I am on the right path. My foundation is solid. I can handle what ever life throws at me, stand and look it squarely in the eye, and make a clear decision knowing immediately if it is the right or wrong choice. Not a bad way to live is it?

## Tradition 10

#### Oops ... Did I Say That?

The day I broke Tradition Ten, I didn't even know it! I had been in AA 13 years and only attending one meeting a week. I had just gotten a sponsor after all these years and hadn't really experienced the true fellowship of AA. It happened at the meeting I always went to but never spoke at. Sitting by my sponsor, I decided to speak, and out of my mouth came the words: "global warming" and "stop pollution." Who could be for global warming and pollution?

No one at the meeting said a word, except one person who made a joke about it. I didn't realize what I had done until the meeting was over. No one chastened me, but I realized I had goofed.

The Traditions are so important because they are the core that keeps AA strong. Many sobriety groups have split up because of different or personal opinions. The Washingtonian Society was a movement among alcoholics before AA began, which started in Baltimore over a century ago, and almost discovered the answer to alcoholism. At first the society was composed entirely of alcoholics trying to help one another. The Washingtonians permitted politicians and reformers, both alcoholics and non-alcoholics, to use the society for their own purposes. Abolition of slavery was a stormy political issue then. Washingtonian speakers publicly and violently took sides on this question. Within a very few years they had completely lost their effectiveness in helping alcoholics.

I had also broken another tradition—Tradition Five, which says that AA has but "one primary purpose"—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers. I definitely do not want to be the reason that upsets a member to become agitated and go out in the drinking world again. Sobriety is too important.
